The Kespukwitk Species at Risk program is looking for a fieldworker and database manager for the Wildcat/Ponhook areas.

Seasonal/term employment:

\$15/hour for 32 hours/week

April 16 - December 21

The duties of the job include, but are not limited to:

- Helping to develop a monitoring protocol
- Monitoring sites for the Eastern Ribbonsnake
- Assisting biologists looking for Eastern Ribbonsnakes and Blanding's Turtles
- Surveying reserve lands for turtles, rare plants, and birds
- Supervising summer student staff
- Survey and document community members' rare species sightings
- Input data, organize digital files and draft reports

Requirements:

- Must have at least one year's related experience
- Data management would be considered an asset
- Priority will be given to applicants who are Aboriginal/ Members of Acadia First Nation Band
- Good knowledge and experience in the specific landscapes of the Wildcat/Ponhook region
- Ability to identify various plants/trees and animals
- Work well independently and in a team
- Able to work long days in various weather conditions and possibly walk long distances through difficult terrain
- Good understanding of digital technical equipment
- Valid drivers' license and access to a vehicle
